

Colchester "Cycle Town"

For many years Colchester has celebrated its status as Britain's oldest recorded town - documented since it was the Celtic stronghold of Camulodunum. Today it is a place which offers a happy blend of heritage of international importance together with a strong contemporary atmosphere including small specialist shops, cafés, restaurants and galleries.

The picture postcard castle, built by the Normans on top of the Roman Temple of Claudius so despised by Queen Boudica in AD60 is now home to the award-winning the nearby Chappel Viaduct is another Castle Museum. The castle is set in a classic Victorian park, just off the High Street, which is a great place to relax after shopping in the town's quiet lanes of small specialist shops. In fact, Colchester is home to Williams & Griffin, Britain's leading independent department store, so finding that special treat should not be difficult. Lovers of contemporary art will need to plan a visit to the new firstsite gallery

opening in late 2010. The new visual arts space will add a 21st century dimension to Colchester's span of architectural gems through the ages. firstsite will have a 200 seat auditorium, shop, café and new parkland sweeping down to the Roman wall. Call 01206 282920 to check the latest update on this new building.

The surrounding area also has a range of places to visit. Colchester Zoo is one of the county's most popular attractions. In the north-west, the East Anglian Railway Museum welcomes lovers of steam and must for the photo album. Colchester has plenty of open spaces and nature reserves. Largest of these is High Woods Country Park on the north of the town. The Visitor Centre, which opens at weekends, is the place to find out all about the natural history of this ancient piece of landscape. And don't miss the Natural History Museum for 'hands on' events.

In the south-east visit Wivenhoe - a delightful gem on the River Colne. Wivenhoe has plenty of delights to charm the visitor. Its history involves fishing, yachts, dinghies, ships and smuggling; a pretty church, with a distinctive cupola on top of its sturdy tower, stands on the site of the first church, built in Saxon times. The streets are small and quaint, leading into each other and ending at the picturesque waterfront where fishing boats and small sailing craft bob at their moorings. Look out for Quay House near the waterfront which has a blue plaque in memory of Sir John Martin-Harvey, actor/manager who was born here in 1863. His father and grandfather were successful designers and builders of racing yachts and schooners. The charming waterfront continues to be alive with fishing boats and small sailing craft. In fact, the place has inspired a number of artists to such an extent, they made it their home. Wivenhoe is surrounded by beautiful countryside, has great walks and rides and wildlife is in abundance.

Dedham

In the north east is the Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, also known as Constable Country. Best discovered on foot or by bike, the Dedham Vale received its national designation due to its cultural importance. Its sublime gently rolling agricultural landscape broken by Dedham church and the mills and barns that Constable immortalised in the 19th century As the areat man himself acknowledged, "Those scenes made me a painter." Dedham itself is populated by pretty cottages and porticoed Georgian homes, sundials, sleepy shutters, wisteria-clad bijoux teahouses and even a pink vicarage. Colchester's range of attractions and places to visit are complemented by a great range of places to stay and eat as you'll need a few days to explore it fully.



12. St Mary the Virgin Church

The tower of the parish church of Dedham is familiar to many who have never visited the village through the work of the great English landscape artist, John Constable, in many of whose paintings it features. It has stood as a witness to the centuries since 1492 and was the last of the socalled 'wool' churches to be completed.

13. Green Island Gardens

Attractions along the route: 1. Colchester Castle Museum & Castle Park

The largest Norman keep in Europe. Superb Roman displays, hands-on activities and tours. The imaginative audio visual displays explain Boudica's burning of the temple and also the civil war siege in 1648. Particularly effective is a sound and light experience which tells of the fate suffered by local 'witches' in the castle jail during the 17th century. Underneath the castle you can visit the foundations of the temple which, as Colchester was then capital of Roman Britain, must have been one of the finest in the Roman Empire. 
